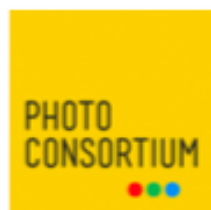

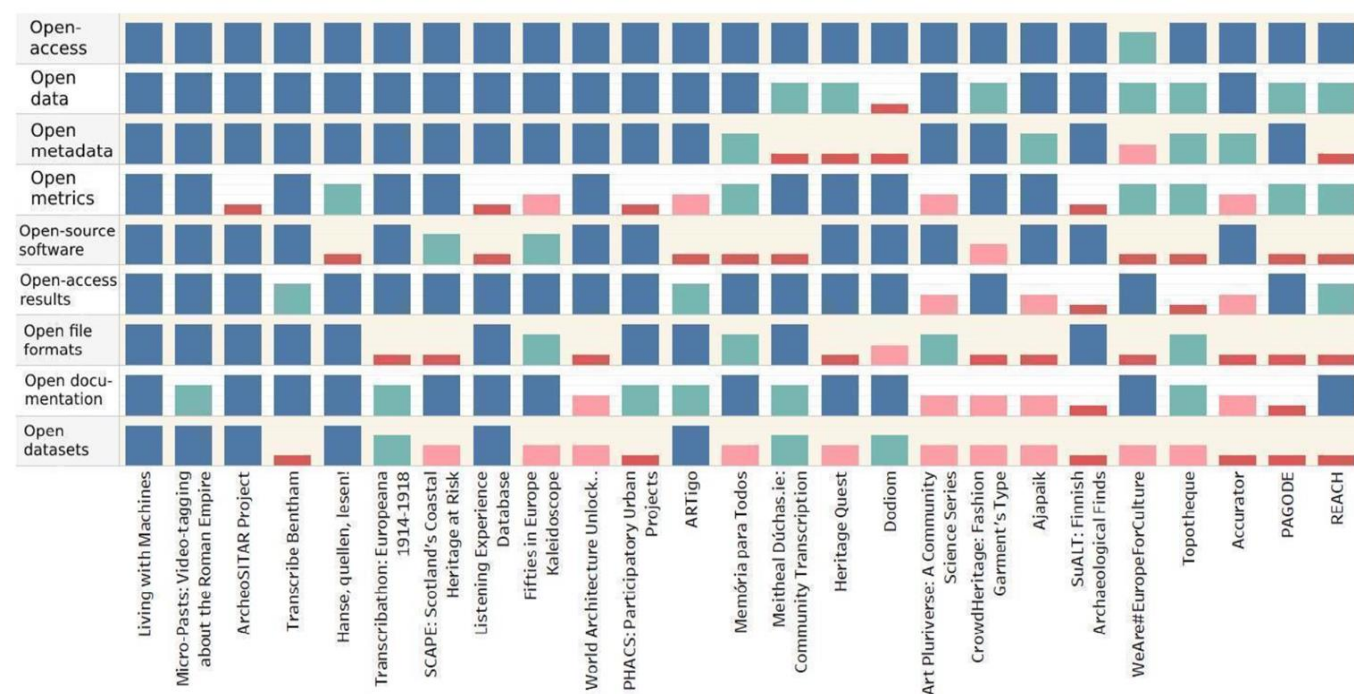
Engaging citizens in education and cultural heritage curation

- *We investigate what needs to be added to **move from crowdsourcing to active citizen science engagement.***

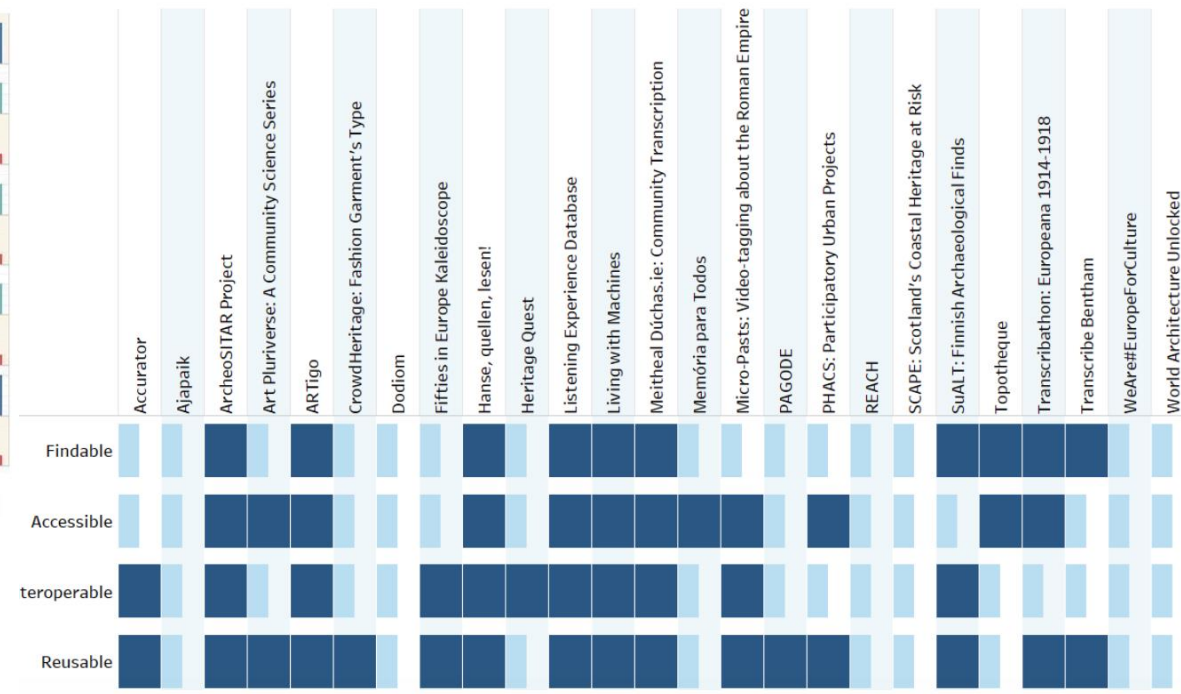

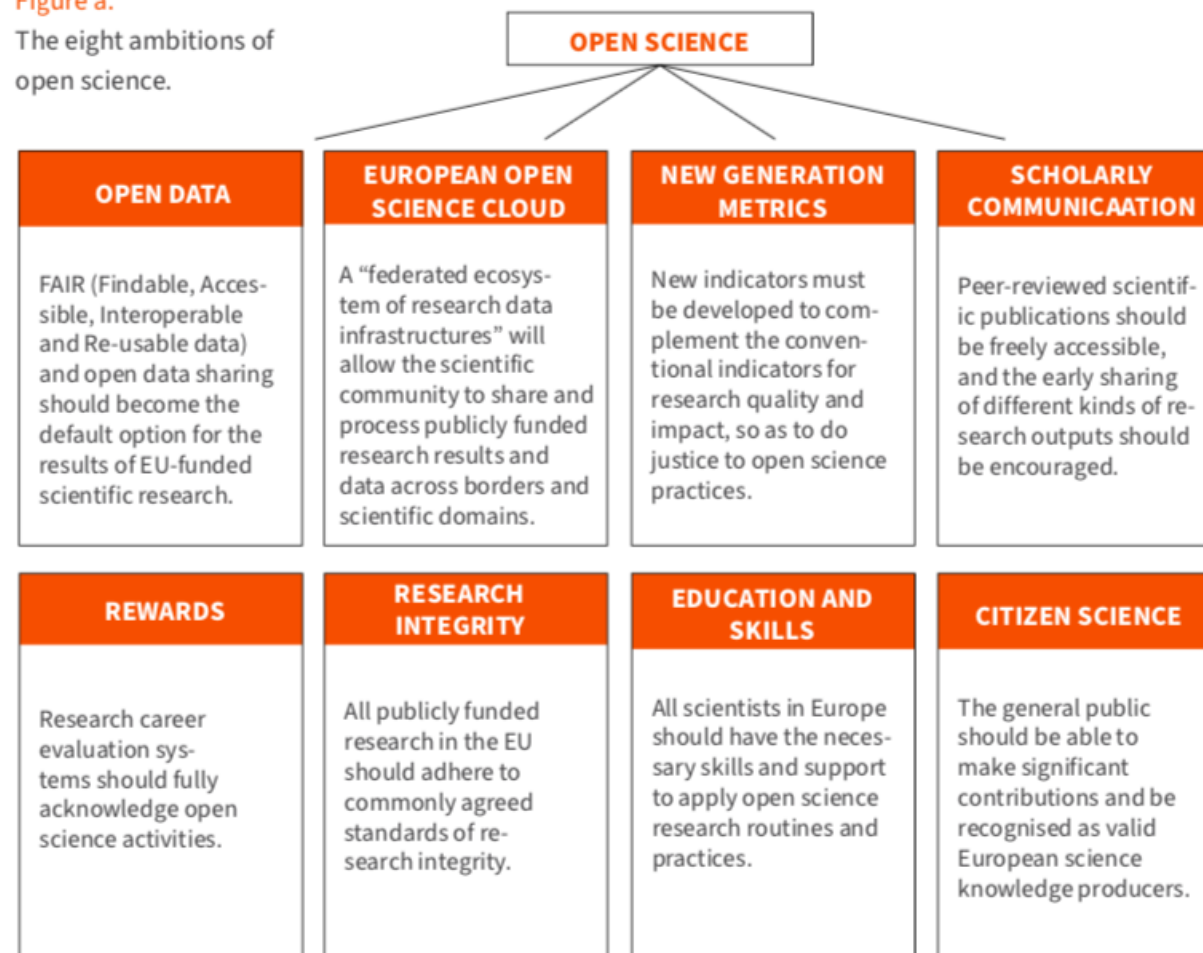

Citizen Science

- *Public participation in scientific research:*
- *“actively involve the public directly in the multifaceted and iterative processes of scientific investigation. Such efforts include citizen science, volunteer monitoring, and participatory action research. Projects that fall into these categories allow participants to learn both science content and process while experiencing the fun and excitement of research.” (Bonney, et al., 2009, p. 10).*



Collaboration with the Cultural Heritage sector

- *Citizen-enhanced open science:*
- *The project engages with stakeholders and professionals in the digital cultural heritage domain, establishing collaboration for knowledge sharing and co-curation between academics and stakeholders.*

 - *Citizen engagement in the Cultural Heritage institutions can link directly into scientific publications*
 - *Higher Education institutions can play a role in supporting Citizen research in Cultural Heritage*

- Manage discord, conflict and divergent opinion
